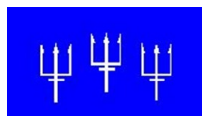

Scheduled Meetings:

Unless otherwise noted, the General Membership Meetings will be held at the BoatUS™ Headquarters facility at 1900. on the second Wednesday of each month except for the months of August and December. Any changes will be posted in this newsletter or on the Squadron web site.

BoatUS Headquarters and meeting location:

880 South Pickett Street, Alexandria VA.

From the Capital Beltway, take the VA-613/ Van Dorn Street exit, exit number 173, towards Franconia. Turn left onto South Van Dorn Street / VA-613 North. Turn left onto South Pickett Street. Go less than .5 miles and turn in at the BoatUS™ sign and go to the lighted parking lot in the rear. Proceed to the entrance.

Boating Accident Reporting

Federal law requires the operator – or owner, if the operator is deceased or unable to make the report – to file a boating accident report with the State reporting authority when, as a result of an occurrence that involves a boat or its equipment:

- A person dies
- A person disappears from the vessel under circumstances that indicate death or injury
- A person is injured and requires medical treatment beyond first aid
- Damage to vessels and other property totals \$2,000 (lower amounts in some states and territories) or more
- The boat is destroyed

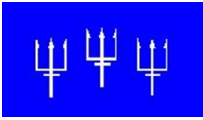

The EXCOM planning committee met in February to draft our goals and objectives for this year in the USPS mission areas of education, community and fraternal. These goals and objectives have been finalized and will be the guide for our activities. I will discuss some of the highlights.

Education – In addition to the Prince William Marina initiative, we plan to partner with the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VGDIF) to teach Boat Virginia courses throughout Northern Virginia. This will be another great opportunity to recruit new members. We also will be offering America's Boating Course (ABC) at various venues in northern Virginia to include GMU, McLean and my goal is to make inroads into Loudoun County. We may even package the ABC course with a seminar or two. We will continue our partnership with the Sea Scouts to offer boating courses that meet their needs. Skipper Tom Ballew has a great group of Sea Scouts!

Community – We will have a strong community presence. Planning is well underway for our Wounded Warrior Cruise at Pax River Naval Air Station on 13 Sep. See P/C Francis' Williamson's article on this topic. This is an event that everyone in NVSPS should support. Ask you how can get involved. P/C George Nartsissov is planning multiple Vessel Safety Check (VSC) events for our VSC examiners. He is also partnering with the US Coast Guard Auxiliary at Prince William Marina and other locations. A VSC event is scheduled for Saturday, 17 May, at the Fairfax Yacht Club to coincide with National Safe Boating Week. We will also be having our spring picnic there on the same day.

Fraternal – First and foremost...have some fun! We intend to hold several NVSPS cruises on the Chesapeake Bay and Potomac River, along with shore-side activities so all members can participate. Squadron cruises are a lot of fun and build camaraderie among members. After all, we are a boating organization so we should be boating. Please let me know if you would like to help organize a cruise. One of the greatest advantages of membership in NVSPS is being able to leverage the boating expertise of our members to assist new members in their boating activities. So, I would like to assign new members an informal mentor from the Squadron who can assist and/or connect new members to others in the Squadron who can provide assistance to them.

Other planned social events include informal squadron picnics at various venues (like Herrington Harbour) and our annual holiday party. We also intend to get a jump on planning for our hospitality room at the 2015 Spring District 5 Conference. We'll start the planning for that event in August. Most importantly, we recognize that we can improve squadron communications of events through use of a published 12 month rolling calendar, enhanced e-mail communications with members and a timely oT&T publication. Please let one of the Bridge members know if there is a topic you would like us to address in our "award winning" oT&T newsletter.

I would like to switch gears for a moment and discuss the 2014 Spring District 5 Conference that was held on 29-30 MAR in Ocean City, MD. We had a good contingent of folks from the Squadron who attended the conference. We sponsored a hospitality room whose theme was "Don't Worry Be Appy". The focus of our presentation was on the various applications available to smart tablets (like iPads) and smart phones (iPhone and Android devices). We had around 175 people come through our hospitality suite. Some people came back two and three times. Our hospitality suite was a tremendous success. We didn't win the top prize (that honor went to the Dundalk Squadron) but I believe we were clearly one of the best! Thanks again to all who participated. It is a lot of fun. I highly recommend that you plan to participate in the 2015 conference.

One of the main goals of the United States Power Squadrons is "boating safety through education"—we believe that an educated boater is a safer boater. USPS provides many skill building opportunities to the general public through a variety of courses, seminars, and marine-related guides. NVSPS is very active in providing instructors who are certified regarding their ability to teach and to use of modern instructional techniques. All classes are fun and informative, and bring you into contact with other boaters.

USPS University has a series of programs targeted to a range of boaters and types of boating. The hallmark of this concept is the Seminar Series. These short seminars are targeted to specific topics and needs, and include valuable take-away guides. Each seminar provides credits toward the Boat Operator Certification program, and credit toward elective courses. The USPS Guides are generally short booklets that provide useful information on a variety of marine-related topics. They are available from United States Power Squadrons Headquarters by calling 1-888-FOR-USPS between 8:30AM and 4:00PM ET Monday through Friday, or on-line via the USPS Ship's Store.

Five Advanced Grade courses are offered by USPS. They are designed to be taken in sequence because each builds on skills taught in the previous course. Elective Courses in six area are offered by USPS. They cover separate and independent topics and therefore may be taken in any order according to a person's interests and time. Vessel Safety Checks

Vessel Safety - Fire extinguishers:

Question: Is there an expiration date of service for a fire extinguisher?

Answer: Maybe! Read on - don't stop here! It appears some newer fire extinguishers have appeared that DO have an expiration date. Look for a statement on the side label for something to the effect "... must be removed from service 12 years after date of manufacture..." Date of manufacture is generally stamped on the bottom of the fire extinguisher. If there is NO label by manufacturer regarding removal of unit from service, then it is up to the user.

The obvious question then is how long does a fire extinguisher last? There is no firm guidance on that. Check the manufacturer's label. Check for obvious damage or deterioration of the extinguisher. If the needle is in the GREEN then it probably is OK. Personally, I would replace the fire extinguisher if the unit is 10 - 15 years old. If you have an automatic unit (Halon type) on board, have it professionally checked. This involves having a certified person inspect and weigh the unit. I had mine inspected by Scotty's in Alexandria (for less than \$15).

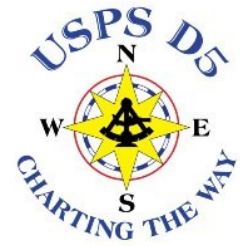
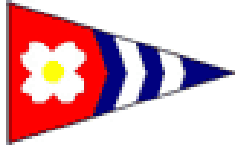

Continue about another 75-100 yards where Furnace Road bears to the left and joins Old Colchester Road. Do not bear to the left, but proceed straight across.

This is a private lane, which leads to the Fairfax Yacht Club. Follow this lane through the gate (it will be open) and park at any open space.

In recognition of the service and sacrifice made by our wounded warriors, the Northern Virginia Sail and Power Squadron extends an invitation to our sixth annual Wounded Warrior Cruise 2014 on Saturday 13 September 2014 from the Patuxent Naval Air Station West Basin Marina Lexington Park, Maryland.



Guests can choose to cruise on one of 10 sail or power boats from 27 to 45 feet. Each boat has an experienced captain and first mate to ensure the safety of our guests, and all vessels have passed US Coast Guard Vessel Safety Examinations.

The day will consist of a five hour boat ride on the Patuxent River and Chesapeake Bay. The captains will select their individual courses on the river and the bay based upon the interests of the guests. Guests and crews will be provided a box lunch consisting of assorted cold cut sandwiches (turkey, ham or vegetarian) on Kaiser Rolls, potato chips, whole fruit, brownie, and plenty of refreshments.

After the cruise we will host a barbeque at the West Basin Marina Pavilion picnic grounds. The barbeque includes hot dogs, hamburgers, chicken breasts in a barbeque sauce, baked beans, potato salad, coleslaw, assorted cookies and beverages.

Bus transportation arranged to and from the Walter Reed National Military Medical Center (WRNMMC) in Maryland and the Fort Belvoir Warrior Transition Unit (WTU) in Virginia to the West Basin Marina. Busses will leave the WRNMMC and WTU facilities in time to arrive at NAS West Basin Marina by 1000, and pick up guests for the return trip at 1730. Guests must be ambulatory.
